Lineworkers put their lives at risk when they work with electricity, whether they are up high in the air working in a bucket truck or on the ground. The danger increases during storms, when working in wet and windy conditions, or when working in snow and ice.

"To be a lineworker, a person needs technical skill, mental fortitude, and physical strength. They need to have a true desire to help others when the power goes out." says Skip Hollcroft, NOVEC's construction supervisor, who oversees all NOVEC line technicians.

## CALL 811 BEFORE YOU DIG

Spring is approaching fast, and it's a great time to do some landscaping around your home — both for beautification and energy efficiency. Planting trees that provide shade on the sunny side of your home can help block the sun's rays heating up your home in summer.

Before you grab a shovel, call 811 — also known as Miss Utility — at least 48 hours before you dig. This law also applies to major construction projects including, decks, patios, and fences.

When you call, tell the operator where you're planning to dig and what type of work you'll be doing. The center will notify the utility companies that serve you, including NOVEC. These companies will send locators to your property to mark underground lines, pipes, and cables. Afterward, you will know their approximate location and can start shoveling — safely. Be sure to dig at least five feet from the mark to stay away from utility easements. This helps keep you safe and helps protect equipment from damage.
